## **Employment in Salem MSA (Marion and Polk Counties): March 2022**

## Salem MSA's Unemployment Rate Drops to 3.8%

The Salem MSA's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 3.8% in March, down from its revised rate of 4.0% in February. Oregon's statewide unemployment rate in March was also 3.8%, down from its revised February rate of 4.0%.

Employment gains in the Salem MSA in March were larger than normal; total nonfarm employment increased by 1,900 jobs, when an employment increase of 1,100 jobs would be expected. As a result, seasonally adjusted employment increased 800 between February and March. With March's gains, employment is -0.3% or 500 jobs below the pre-pandemic employment level in February 2020.

Private-sector job losses in March were seen in professional and business services (-300 jobs, -1.9%) and information (-100, -6.7%).

Education and health services employment grew 1,000 or 3.3% in March. Leisure and hospitality employment grew 300 or 1.9%. Construction and retail trade each added 200 jobs in March.

State government added 100 jobs in March. Local government employment added 300. Federal government employment was unchanged in March.

The most recent month is preliminary, the prior month is revised. Prepared in cooperation with the U.S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics.

Civilian labor force includes employed and unemployed individuals 16 years and older by place of residence. Employed includes payroll employment, self-employed, unpaid family workers, domestics, agriculture, and labor disputants. Unemployment rate is calculated by dividing unemployed by civilian labor force.

Nonfarm Payroll Employment: Offical Oregon Series. Data are by place of work and cover full- and part-time employees who worked or received pay for the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. The data exclude the self-employed, volunteers, unpaid family workers, and domestics.

The Oregon Employment Department and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) work cooperatively to develop and publish monthly payroll employment and labor force data for Oregon's metropolitan areas and counties. The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
