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Employment in Tillamook County: June 2020

Employment grows by 490 more than expected in June

Seasonally adjusted nonfarm payroll employment increased by 490 in June to 8,130 jobs. Seasonally adjusted figures compare expected changes with actual changes. A gain of 170 was expected for the month, but the county added 660 jobs. The private sector grew by 650 jobs, and net government employment was up by 10 jobs. Leisure and hospitality added 430 jobs. Other services (which includes personal care businesses and churches) saw employment increase by 100 jobs. Nondurable goods manufacturing and retail trade each added 40 jobs over the month. Other industries had smaller changes.

June's total nonfarm employment numbers show a loss of 1,390 jobs compared with one year before, a decrease of 14.2 percent. Every major industry lost jobs over the year. Leisure and hospitality shed the most jobs; the industry was down 680 jobs over the year, a drop of 40.5 percent.

Tillamook County's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate dropped from last month. It was 12.3 percent in June, down from 17.0 percent in May. It was 4.0 percent the year before. Tillamook County's unemployment rate reached a peak of 12.2 percent during the Great Recession. The statewide unemployment rate was 11.2 percent in June, and the national rate was 11.1 percent.

The Oregon Employment Department and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) work cooperatively to develop and publish monthly payroll employment and labor force data for Oregon's metropolitan areas and counties. The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
