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## **Employment in Tillamook County: April 2022**

### **Seasonally adjusted employment dipped by 20 in April**

Seasonally adjusted nonfarm payroll employment decreased by 20 in April to 9,290 jobs. Seasonally adjusted figures compare expected changes with actual changes. Employment was expected to increase by 170 jobs, but the county added only 150 jobs. The private sector added 140 jobs, and total government employment inched up by 10. Leisure and hospitality employment increased by 90 jobs. Other industries had smaller changes.

April's total nonfarm employment numbers show a gain of 170 jobs compared with one year before, an increase of 1.9%. The county lost 1,520 jobs in April 2020 as the pandemic hit, and it remains 320 jobs below its pre-pandemic employment of April 2019. Some major industries gained jobs over the past year. Food manufacturing grew by 80 jobs. Leisure and hospitality added 70 jobs. Local government regained 240 jobs over the year. On the other hand, mining and logging cut 80 jobs over the year, and trade, transportation, and utilities was down by 70 jobs.

Tillamook County's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 4.0% in April, unchanged from March. It was 6.0% the year before. The statewide unemployment rate was 3.7% in April, and the national rate was 3.6%.

The Oregon Employment Department and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) work cooperatively to develop and publish monthly payroll employment and labor force data for Oregon's metropolitan areas and counties. The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
