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Employment in Eastern Oregon: April 2024

Eastern Oregon Unemployment Rates Remain Comparatively Low

The April seasonally adjusted unemployment rates decreased over the year in Grant and Wallowa counties while increasing in the other four Eastern Oregon counties. In Grant and Wallowa counties, they are the lowest April rates since comparable statistics began in 1990. The April 2024 rates are the second lowest April rates in Baker and Malheur counties and the third lowest in Harney and Union counties. The largest over-the-year decrease came in Wallowa County where the seasonally adjusted rate moved 0.2 percentage point lower to reach 4.4%. The largest increase came in Union County where the seasonally adjusted rate rose 0.7 percentage point to reach 4.4%.

Between April 2023 and April 2024, unadjusted unemployment rates increased in four of six Eastern Oregon counties. Wallowa County was the only county to see a decrease in the raw unemployment rate, falling 0.1 percentage point to 4.5%. This represented the lowest April unadjusted rate for the county since 1990. Grant County's rate remained unchanged over the year to tie for its lowest April rate. In Malheur and Union counties, the April 2024 rates are the second lowest unadjusted April unemployment rates since 1990, behind only April 2023. In Baker and Harney counties, the only lower April rates were in 2022 and 2023. The smallest over-the-year increase came in Baker County where the raw rate increased by 0.3 percentage point to reach 3.9%. The largest increase came in Harney and Union counties, where the raw rates increased by 0.7 percentage point to reach 4.2% and 4.0%, respectively.

Baker County's nonfarm payroll employment decreased by 20 since April 2023. Employment decreased by 20 jobs in the private sector and saw a net change of zero jobs in the public sector. Leisure and hospitality led losses, down 30. The largest increase came in professional and business services, which was up 20 jobs. Overall employment increased by 10 jobs over the month with small gains narrowly outpacing small losses across industries. The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate decreased by 0.1 percentage point over the month to 4.5%. The raw unemployment rate decreased by 1.4 percentage points to 3.9%.

Grant County's nonfarm payroll employment increased by 50 jobs over the year. The private sector dropped 50 jobs while the public sector increased by 100. Local government added 90 jobs to lead gains. Wholesale trade and retail trade led losses, each down 20. Over the month, total employment rose 20 jobs led by a gain of 20 jobs in leisure and hospitality. The seasonally adjusted unemployment

rate held steady over the month at 4.9%. The raw unemployment rate fell 1.7 percentage points to 5.8%.

Harney County's nonfarm payroll employment decreased by 70 jobs over the year. The private sector decreased by 50 jobs and the public sector dropped 20. Losses were led by retail trade and local government, each down 20. Gains were confined to private education and health services, up 10 jobs. Total employment increased by 50 jobs over the month, led by a gain in leisure and hospitality, up 30. The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was unchanged over the month at 4.4%. The raw unemployment rate decreased by 1.3 percentage points to 4.2%.

Malheur County's nonfarm payroll employment increased by 360 jobs over the year. The private sector rose by 130 and the public sector added 230 jobs. Local government added 180 to lead gains followed by private education and health services, up 100. Retail trade dropped 40 jobs to lead losses. Total employment increased by 40 over the month, with retail trade leading the gains, up 50 jobs. The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate held steady over the month at 3.9%. The raw unemployment rate dropped 0.8 percentage point to 3.4%.

Union County's total nonfarm payroll employment decreased by 50 jobs over the year. The private sector added 20 jobs and the public sector increased by 30. Manufacturing and leisure and hospitality led losses, each down 40 jobs. Construction led gains, up 50, followed by financial activities and local government, each up 40 jobs. Total employment increased by 50 jobs over the month, with construction leading the way, up 40. The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate went unchanged over the month at 4.4%. The raw unemployment rate decreased by 1.0 percentage point to 4.0%.

Wallowa County's nonfarm payroll employment increased by 30 jobs from April 2023 to April 2024. The private sector added 10 jobs and the public sector increased by 20. Gains were led by wholesale and retail trade, and leisure and hospitality, up 30 and 20 jobs, respectively. Transportation, warehousing, and utilities led losses, down 20 jobs. Total nonfarm employment increased by 70 over the month, led by gains in professional and business services, and leisure and hospitality, each up 30 jobs. The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate held steady over the month at 4.4%. The raw unemployment rate dropped 1.5 percentage points to 4.5%.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
