Employment in Lincoln County: August 2023

Seasonally adjusted employment increased by 60 in August

Seasonally adjusted nonfarm payroll employment increased by 60 in August to 18,520 jobs. Seasonally adjusted figures compare expected changes with actual changes. A gain of 100 jobs was expected for the month, but the county's total nonfarm employment rose by 160. The private sector added 110 jobs. Food manufacturing gained 40 jobs. Other private industries had smaller changes. Government employment increased by 50.

August's total nonfarm employment numbers show a gain of 470 jobs compared with one year before, an increase of 2.5%. The county lost 4,270 jobs in March 2020 as the pandemic hit, and it remained 130 jobs below its pre-pandemic employment of August 2019. Accommodation and food services was up 280 jobs over the year to August and other services grew by 150 jobs. On the other hand, construction was down 70 jobs compared with the previous year. Private education and health services shed 60 jobs over the year. Local government, including tribal and education, added 170 jobs over the past year.

Lincoln County's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 4.1% in August, essentially unchanged from 4.2% in July. It was 5.5% the year before. The statewide unemployment rate was 3.4% in August, and the national rate was 3.8%.

Civilian labor force includes employed and unemployed individuals 16 years and older by place of residence. Employed includes payroll employment, self-employed, unpaid family workers, domestics, agriculture, and labor disputants. Unemployment rate is calculated by dividing unemployed by civilian labor force.

Nonfarm Payroll Employment: Data are by place of work and cover full- and part-time employees who worked or received pay for the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. The data exclude the self-employed, volunteers, unpaid family workers, and domestics.

The Oregon Employment Department and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) work cooperatively to develop and publish monthly payroll employment and labor force data for Oregon's metropolitan areas and counties. The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
